Special Education Legislative Summit 2022

The Special Education Legislative Summit is a joint activity organized by the Council for Exceptional Children and the Council of Administrators of Special Education. Your Kentucky team was thrilled to be back on Capitol Hill this summer! Typically held in Washington, D.C. during July, the Special Education Legislative Summit (SELS) is an opportunity for educators from across the country to advocate for change with Members of Congress. This year, your small but mighty team of eight representatives from Kentucky participated in in-depth training about <u>three primary issues</u> and received legislative updates on key issues impacting the field of special education. The main initiatives of focus were: <u>appropriations</u>, <u>mental health</u>, and <u>educator</u> <u>shortages</u>. We met with Senator McConnell's staff, as well as each of our U. S. Representatives to not only share the needs across the Commonwealth, but also to relay our appreciation for their ongoing support. Team Kentucky, which included our Special Education Teacher of the Year, proudly represented KYCEC members and Kentucky educators.

KYCCBD celebrated school SUPERHEROES from across the state at the 2022 Behavior Institute!


